State of Emergency

What do the words "State of Emergency" mean? A State of Emergency allows the state and local governments to request funding and "to perform actions or impose policies that it would normally not be permitted to undertake. A government can declare such a state during a natural disaster, civil unrest, armed conflict, medical pandemic or epidemic or other biosecurity risk. Such declarations alert citizens to change their normal behavior and orders government agencies to implement emergency plans."

The State, County and City have each presented emergency plans. The State of Emergency can be updated on a weekly basis. As of my writing this in May, the governor has loosened opening plans in various places in Florida, including Palm Beach County but excluding Broward and Dade. Restaurants and some stores are open, all with specific guidelines. It seems beaches will reopen before this goes to publication. In Palm Beach County and the city of Delray, we are granted the ability to open pools and outdoor recreational facilities but not any indoor facilities. Each type of facility has its own governmental guidelines we are responsible for enforcing.

For each, the common denominators are six feet (6') of social distancing, masks to and from any facility and monitoring to ensure we conform to the limited constraints. Tennis using only 7 courts. The county is reevaluating restrictions each week. Currently pool and courts are randomly monitored. Other requirements for the present are:

- Doubles allowed for tennis and pickleball. Sign up at Tennis Center. No walk-ons.
- Only residents allowed to play on the courts, no spectators.
- Residents only allowed to swim or walk in Pool #5 at this time.
- May bring and take home your own noodle and chair.
- Specified hours are posted in each area. Changes will be sent in eblasts.

These restrictions will likely change over time. It is a most challenging time for the board, many of whom have spent countless hours on webinars addressing the legal, medical and financial aspects of COVID-19 and how it effects Florida and community living. What can we do? What must we do? What do we think we should do? And HOW? How to keep Rainberry Bay safe? How to keep the residents as healthy as possible?

Thankfully, we have people willing to shop for us, restaurants with drive-by pickup service, food delivery options, volunteers at the open facilities, and the kindness of our neighbors. Please, keep yourself and your families safe and healthy. Our community and I, personally, thank you!



YOUR CHANCE TO PARTICIPATE IN RB GOVERNANCE

On Wednesday, May 20, a Town Hall meeting took place for Villas homeowners via Zoom. The main topic was the proposed revision of the Villas Declarations, copies of which were mailed out to Villas homeowners prior to the meeting. In the mailing packet, I included some basic background information for the documents as well as a justification for updating the documents.

I also let Villas owners know that I would answer any questions they posed either before the meeting or during the meeting. There were six questions asked of me before the meeting, and I incorporated the answering of those questions into the agenda of the meeting. Further discussions of those questions as well as other questions brought up during the meeting were handled via the chat function of Zoom.

Another method used to promote discussion was to put polls up on the screen, asking how attendees felt about some of the issues being raised in the proposed revision. These polls helped me and the other Board members get a feel for how the owners were leaning on those issues. They also showed the attendees how their neighbors were leaning.

The presence of one of the Villas attorneys, Chris Reed, was especially helpful in explaining the intricacies of legal requirements for our community. All in all, a lively yet civil interaction occurred; and the feedback from attendees will help guide the next revision of the Declarations for Villas.

As soon as that next revision is completed, Villas owners will once again be contacted; and, hopefully, voting on the final version can begin. At this time, RBB Boards are taking a close look at electronic voting. We have contacted a company for pertinent information, and we are making sure we would be in compliance with all HOA laws and our own documents before going further into this plan. I am hoping that we can utilize electronic voting because it would be more efficient and less expensive than the way we currently vote. I will emphasize here the cost savings because our older community requires a lot of expensive maintenance, and we must conserve our funding in any way that we can.

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MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR:

JEAN-ELLEN KING

JEAN-ELLEN KING spread a blanket on a beach in North Miami twenty-three years ago after a grueling interview for a teaching job in Florida. (By the way, she got the job.) Unbeknownst to her, SANDY WASSERMAN, a handsome stranger, watched her relax on a blanket as she admired the scenery. Sandy approached her and said, "I am normally very shy and have never done anything like this before but there is something about your energy that I find very attractive." It was a great line and it worked. They were both separated from their spouses at the time and were at loose ends. They got their divorces and found their happiness together.

Before they married, whenever Sandy proposed, Jean-Ellen would say, "Why marry?" She was content in their relationship as it was. Both were observant in their religion, keeping kosher and celebrating Jewish holidays. She changed her mind about getting married when their Rabbi advised them that the Jewish religion strongly believed in the sanctity of marriage. They have ten grandchildren. Jean-Ellen loves hearing them call her Nana, which is what she called her grandmother.

Jean-Ellen was raised in Clark, New Jersey, where she attended public school from kindergarten through high school. Because she was able to write all the alphabet letters and numbers and could tie her own shoelaces and her classmates' laces as well, she was admitted to kindergarten at the age of four.

When she was twelve years old in junior high school, she learned how to sew. Jean-Ellen showed her seamstress grandmother a skirt she had just completed in school. Her grandmother looked it over and said, "You know, my dear, a good seamstress has the inside of a garment looking as nice as the outside." This was a lesson she followed ever since. She wished to make her grandmother proud of her.

While in high school Jean-Ellen loved the music of the Beatles and loved studying French. She would translate her beloved Beatles' songs into French. She chose to enroll in Elmira College in New York State because it was a small girls' school which



offered a junior year in Paris, France. From September to June, during her junior year, Jean-Ellen studied literature and art at the Sorbonne, and visited other European countries. She graduated from Elmira with a double major in French and Sociology. She went on to obtain a Master's Degree in Education. Over the years she taught in schools in Connecticut, Dutchess County, New York, and Broward County.

Back in 1988, in New York, Jean-Ellen taught ten-year old children in fifth grade. Since then, a dozen of these pupils have kept in touch with her through Facebook. She recalled that one of them had trouble remembering whether the 'e' or the 'i' followed the 'h' in the word 'their'. Jean-Ellen had her spell the word aloud and write it correctly on the blackboard fifty times. The pupil mastered the correct spelling and grew up to be a psychiatrist.

When Jean-Ellen was teaching second grade in Sunrise, Florida, one of her young students told her that his five-year old sister was dying from leukemia in a hospital. Jean-Ellen told him that she regularly donates blood and so she contacted the little girl's parents and doctor. Almost immediately, it was confirmed that her blood type matched the child's. Jean-Ellen did a direct donation to the little girl in the hospital. Within twelve hours, the child woke up and said, "I'm hungry!" Jean-Ellen laughed at

that because that's what she would have said.

After twenty-four years of teaching, Jean-Ellen and Sandy retired to Rainberry Bay, where her parents owned a home. Jean-Ellen and Sandy are both active in our community. Sandy is involved with an orchid project which mounts orchids on trees throughout the community.

When the pandemic reached the United States, Jean-Ellen began sewing face masks for Rainberry-ites. "Do you want a print or solid color?" she asked me as we passed each other on our morning walk. she on her bicycle, me on foot. It was a timely gift because I didn't know where to find face masks. Jean-Ellen also finds people to help through her synagogue. She calls people who belong to her congregation who are not feeling well. One of the people Jean-Ellen called had a FaceTime consultation with her doctor. He told her. "Raise your right hand, raise your left hand, stand on one foot, touch your nose." Jean-Ellen said, "Thank God you weren't talking to your gynecologist!"

Before the pandemic kicked in, Jean-Ellen was busy and active with jogging, riding her bike, swimming, bowling on the Rainberry Bay league and playing mahjongg twice a week. Now she spends her time making masks. In one month, she created over four hundred fabric masks. She told me, "I'll continue to make masks as long as I have requests for them and my supplies last."

I always enjoy watching Jean-Ellen and Sandy dance at parties in our theater. Jean-Ellen still maintains her love affair with France. She was thrilled when she saw the Eiffel Tower for the first time and became a collector of all things Eiffel! She has an Eiffel Tower room in their home.

Thank you, Jean-Ellen for your enthusiasm, kindness, and caring personality.

DESTINATION: NAPLES, FL

Back in March, many of us did not think we would be considering vacation plans this year. With the State open for business, now is the time to reel in the discounts on travel right in our backyard.

Naples is one of my favorite Florida staycations. This idyllic destination is located just 130 miles to our west and a short drive across Alligator Alley, yet it feels worlds away.

Here is the lowdown on this highfalutin hip town. Former Confederate General and Kentucky US Senator John Stuart Williams and Louisville Courier-Journal publisher, Walter N. Haldeman, founded Naples in the 1880s when it was just a tiny seaside village.

You see, back in the 1880s, Naples was only accessible by boat. Those who were able to visit returned home to describe the city as reminiscent of Naples, Italy. Naples quickly became known for its balmy climate and plentiful fishing. Tourism boomed, and the two gentlemen returned to Naples, formed The Naples Company, and began building this winter getaway. First, the Naples Pier was erected. Next came the Naples Hotel.

Naples remained a secluded getaway for wealthy northerners until around 1927 when rail service was introduced to the area. When World War II ended, Naples became a popular destination for tourists from all over the country.

As a point of reference, the original Naples Hotel was purchased by Henry B. Watkins Sr, a toy manufacturer from Ohio. Watkins also bought The Beach Club and adjoining the golf course. The hotel is now known as the Naples Beach Hotel and Golf Club.

Today, downtown Naples is known for its million-dollar homes, swanky restaurants, pristine beaches, and high-end shopping.

Downtown Naples went through a "sort

of" renaissance, creating a renewed and refreshed café style experience. The revamping of 5th Avenue made it the place to be seen. An endless choice of unique restaurants and bars with something for every palate stretches for blocks. Seating spills onto the sidewalks.

But as coronavirus continues to spread at a time when climate change has increased the destructive potential of a host of natural disasters, the scenario could become a frightening reality — one that officials and experts say we need to be prepared for. Even in normal times, natural disasters require a small army of government staff, first responders, relief organizations and volunteers to move people out of harm's way and provide victims with basic necessities like shelter, food and medicine." As we are approaching the beginning of 2020 Hurricane season, your Rainberry Bay CERT team is preparing. This year, our preparation must go where no one has gone before. Not only do we face the challenges of dealing with the aftermath of a disaster with limited resources and members, we now have to factor in the COVID-19 epidemic.

This season will see a larger number of residents here, as many snowbirds have not as yet or will not be traveling back north due to the pandemic. In past years, part of the clubhouse remained open for residents to come to if they lost power. Due to the pandemic this year, once CERT sets up our Incident Command Post and Triage Area, the entire clubhouse will be off limits. This measure is needed to insure the risk of contamination and/or cross contamination be held to a minimum. As it is, CERT is not and has not been trained or prepared to deal with the pandemic. If people are allowed to come and go, the chances of contamination will rise exponentially and it will put the all the volunteers in danger, forcing the closing of the triage area, staging area and Command Center.

Yes, these are troubling times and some extreme measures are being considered and revamped in order to deal with a disaster. Your CERT team cannot and will not put ourselves in danger if security measures put in place are broken. We just don't have enough volunteers to cover this entire community.

We are fortunate in Rainberry Bay to have retired nurses and retired first responders as part of our team, all of whom are willing to run toward the impending disaster. We count on you, our Rainberry Bay family, to support us by not placing us in further danger and think about the safety of others.

HURRICANE SEASON IS HERE: NOW WHAT?

While we were looking the other way, hurricane season has crept up on us. Sure it's only June and the most active time of the year is usually August through October. But, this is Florida. Weather as well as power outages are unpredictable. So, when the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAAA) predicts an "above normal" hurricane season, we should pay attention. This means 7-9 hurricanes and 2-4 major hurricanes could develop. Some could make it to our East Coast. But, predicting exactly where is always tricky because storms move around. It is vital to prepare your home inside and out, the sooner the better. As you shop whether in person or online, think about having enough supplies for several days. Even without a direct hit, ten percent of Rainberry residents lost power for about a week after hurricane Irma in 2017. Begin purchasing bottled water and nonperishable foods that you could either heat on your barbecue, camping stove or eat cold. Make sure to have a can opener. Batteries usually last 10 years. This is the time to purchase battery operated flashlights, lanterns, fans as well as radios. For complete information on how to prepare go to: http://discover.pbcgov.org and enter "hurricane planning guide" in the search bar. The guide is very comprehensive.

In Rainberry Bay, we have protocols that our management company follows to secure our property. We have developed some internal protocols, keeping our guardhouse functional and helping our neighbors (CERT) after a storm.

BOCCE: STAYING CONNECTED

A month (or more) without bocce was like a day without sunshine, a rare occurrence in Florida! A drive by the empty court brought back memories of spirited play, league victories, birthday celebrations, and just hanging out with the bocce "family."

But, on May 6, with the permission of the Rainberry Board, bocce play resumed, albeit with restrictions. As players gathered, it was evident they respected the rules of wearing masks and gloves, practicing social distancing of spectators, allowing only two players

on each team, and sanitizing the balls after play. We are grateful for the volunteer monitors — **CAMILLE AVARELLO** and **VITO TARRICONE** - who are working to keep us safe during this transition.

Players have expressed appreciation for opening the courts, but note that it is a much quieter game and a little more tiring as each player throws more balls during a game. We are hopeful for a time when bocce and other activities get back to normal. In the meantime, we wish everyone a safe and happy summer.



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REUSE, REPURPOSE: FOOD SCRAPS AND PEELS Lois Wiesler

Don't throw your kitchen scraps away; put them to work. The outer skins of fruit and vegetables are filled with flavor and vitamins, and most often have enough matter left in them for another go-round.

TO ENHANCE FOOD

- Make lemon pepper: Mix lemon extract powder with freshly cracked pepper.
- Make zest: If you've juiced lemons, limes, oranges or grapefruit but don't have an immediate need for zest, you can make it anyway and dry or freeze it for future use. Try to scrape just the outer layer, the white layer of pith is bitter. Freeze in an airtight container. To dry, spread the zest on a towel and leave until dried, and store in a clean jar.
- Make citrus olive oil: Pound citrus peel (pith removed) in a mortar and pestle with some oil added. Place in a

jar with more oil and let rest for six hours. Strain into a clean jar.

- Make potato crisps: Mix potato peels with enough lemon juice and olive oil to evenly coat. Spread the potato peels in a layer on a baking sheet and cook at 400 degrees, stirring once, until golden brown (about 10 minutes). Season to taste.
- Make stock: Boil potato peels, onion skins, carrot peels, leek ends, etc. for vegetable stock. (Also save fresh herb stems for this!)
 - Boost soup and stock: Cheese rinds (sans wax) can be placed in soup stocks for an awesome secret boost of flavor and texture.
- Add 'meat' to greens: Cheese rinds can also be added to braised greens for added depth of flavor.

FOOD SCRAPS IN YOUR BEAUTY ROUTINE

- Make a banana sugar scrub: Sprinkle sugar on the flesh side of banana peels and use as a soft, exfoliating loofah. Rub gently all over your body and then rinse in the shower.
- Refresh your face: For a skin tonic, rub orange or grapefruit peels on your face (avoiding your eyes) and then gently rinse with warm water.
- Moisturize: Rub the fleshy part of an avocado peel on your face for a rich moisturizer.
- Relieve your peepers: Potato peels can reduce puffiness around eyes; press the moist side of the fresh peels to the skin for 15 minutes.

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

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
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
