# Rainberry Bay HOA Board Approves Formation of New STORM Committee



The Rainberry Bay Homeowners Association Board has approved the official formation of the STORM Committee (STORM), a dedicated volunteer group aimed at enhancing disaster preparedness and response within our community. According to Jon Brucks, Chairperson of STORM, "The creation of this committee represents a significant step toward safeguarding the safety and wellbeing of all residents until first responders are available to enter our community. After a disaster, emergency services can be overwhelmed with requests for assistance. Depending on the magnitude of the disaster, it may be several hours or days

that we are on our own."

The Rainberry Bay STORM Committee's primary goal is to research, understand, and document all aspects of disaster preparedness and response in Rainberry Bay," said Jon Brucks. "If there's an incident. we will be ready to spring into action. By incorporating the existing Hurricane Education Committee and CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) into one entity, the committee





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### MASTER BOARD NEWS

The three associations are working on compiling information regarding what RB does and does not do. This will help residents, the management team and future boards.

There have been misconceptions over the years about what we do and many have been told by their realtors that "we do everything" when we do not. We won't help you set up your home for a hurricane, won't close your shutters and won't move the plants on your property. We're not responsible for your garden beds though we trim privacy and perimeter hedges. We do have blue and red reflectors – blue indicating no pest control spray which you sign up for, and red indicating no trimming (for specific plants or an entire property).

There are two types of pest control – one for turf

(for example chinch bugs or red ants) vs. spraying the perimeter of your home/villa or its interior (ants or palmettos). The association covers both.

Your board works hard each year to make our best guesstimate in planning the budget. The reserve study information only goes so far as some items (air conditioning, roofs, furniture) don't always have the exact life-span they expect. We don't want to make it unaffordable to live here but we also want to have enough to cover our expenses. As a not-for-profit, we hope to balance the books at the end of each year and still have reserves for that proverbial "rainy day". We can't predict if there will be a hurricane or tornado in this area and what damage that may bring. We can only do our best to plan for our future.

# Why is it important to acquire permits for changes to my home?

I thought I would share this article written by Andra Hopulele, Senior Real Estate Writer at Point2.

### Why are permits needed?

The main thing building permits aim to achieve is not just ensuring that construction work is done in accordance with building codes and zoning, but that the job is performed safely. And because the safety of both you, your family and your neighbors is paramount, performing a job without a permit when one is needed is illegal.

In areas where wildfires or hurricanes are common, building permits aim to reduce both property damage as well as loss of human lives. But building permits are essential even if you live somewhere unlikely to be struck by natural disasters.

Picture the following scenario: you're planning to upgrade your electrical panel and outlets. In order to save time and money, you decide to skip ap-

plying for a permit, which is illegal for this type of work. You finish the job, and several weeks later, a short circuit causes an electrical fire in your home. Luckily, nobody is hurt, but you suffer serious property damage. Even if you have fire insurance on your home, the insurance company can deny coverage due to the fact that the work was done without a permit.

### When do I need a permit?

The City of Delray has a website to assist you. Search using your internet browser City of Delray Beach Permits and it will walk you through the process. Please note that most contractors will apply for the permits while handyman or do it yourself homeowners need to complete this before you begin a job.

Before you start any work, please follow the rules!

Within Rainberry we have required steps that must be followed. These are outlined in the "Rainberry Bay Architectural Control Board Rules for Architectural and Landscaping

Changes." The Application for changes is available on line or you can pick up an application in the office. If you need assistance in completing the form, ask the office to contact a member of the committee who can assist you.

When you sell your house, any realtor who has seen other houses in Rainberry will know walls have been removed, high hats added, kitchen and baths remodeled, etc. and should advise a buyer to ask for permits. Getting permits and complying with current codes after the fact, when under pressure to complete a closing will cause more grief than doing it right in the beginning.

### The ACC/B Committee:

The committee has many experienced members that understand construction, the permit process within the city, and other important steps in the process with the homeowner's best interests in mind. Its mission is to ensure your project is successful following the Rainberry and City of Delray Beach rules.

### Irrigation Geysers, Gushers, and Stuck Valves David Kulick

A geyser is water shooting into the air, but is it an emergency? Mostly the answer is no. We have 24,000 heads, and a few are going to blow out of the pipe on an almost daily basis. The end result is a stream of water shooting into the air. usually fairly spectacularly, but geysers almost always occur when the station (the area being watered) is on and will turn off when the clock moves to the next station, and each station runs around 30 minutes.

It becomes an emergency if the water is getting into your house. In this case, call the office (561-272-6560) and they will try to get someone over to shut it off, but if they're busy or it's not during regular business hours you might have to wait it out. You can place a brick or recycle bin or something heavy over the geyser and that should deflect the water.

In either case, we want to get

it fixed before it comes on again. It's best to take a picture of it while it's geysering (I made up a new word) and attach it to the irrigation service request you are going to make. We'll have an article about how to submit a service request online hopefully in the next Beacon.

A gusher is water that is coming out of the ground where it shouldn't. If it is only gushing when your irrigation is running, that's a local break and just needs a service request. If it's on continuously, then we have a more serious situation. It could be a city water main or an irrigation main, and we can find out by testing for chlorine if staff is available, since city water will have a low level and irrigation water has none.

Anytime you see water coming up from the ground or running along a street where you don't normally see it, consider it an emergency. Call staff and if you can't reach them, call the city (561-243-7312) and leave a message, they will call back.

Irrigation controllers (clocks) turn your irrigation on and off by opening and closing a valve near your house. If irrigation doesn't turn off, that's likely a stuck valve. If you notice that your sprinklers or your neighbors have been running for an hour or more, notify the office, preferably before the irrigation guys leave at 4.

The usual cause of a stuck valve is that dirt has gotten into it and is preventing it from closing. We live in a place where it can rain an inch an hour, so a stuck valve isn't an emergency unless water is building up by the house. If the staff is gone, we may have to leave it or shut down the whole system.

## **Peak Season is Here!**

The only thing we can truly count on in hurricane season is that it is unpredictable! So it's time to take stock (again) of your preparedness. While you may know how to shop and prepare your home, it might be more challenging to find info on evacuation and shelters. What would you do if evacuation were needed or your power went out for an extended period?

We are not considered to be in an evacuation zone but were a category 4 or 5 Hurricane on the way, you might choose to leave.

**Evacuation**: If you have special needs such as oxygen, speak with your doctor, family, or caregiver about what you will need. Special needs shelters require preregistration and have

requirements. Here is some info to share with your neighbors if they cannot use a computer or print.

Special Needs Shelter Criteria (<u>Caregivers must accompany</u> their patients)

•Persons who cannot be with-

out electricity because they depend upon their own electrically energized life support equipment within the home (i.e. oxygen, nebulizers, G/NG Tubes, uncomplicated IV, etc).

- •Persons that require assistance with transferring or need a Hoyer Lift.
- •Persons receiving assistance with activities of daily living who need a place to evacuate with their caregiver.
- •Persons who with progressive Alzheimer's or Dementia who need a place to evacuate with their caregiver.

If you do not have special needs but feel the need to leave, have a "to-go" bag ready.

in advance of a category 3-5 hurricane to avoid the traffic, find a hotel or motel out of the track of the storm or perhaps visit friends or relatives out of state. However, it's challenging

even for the experts to predict where a hurricane will track. We've all heard stories of people who left the coast for Orlando only to have the storm follow them there.

# Succotash with Chicken NATIVE AMERICAN (Cherokee) Submitted by Rose Parrin

Usually made with small game such as rabbit, turkey or other fowl, this dish was introduced to settlers in the 17th century. Some version of this indigenous dish was made by Native Ameri-

cans across the continent. This was my Great Grandmother's recipe. She was 100% Cherokee. She and my great Grandfather, an English Immigrant, were joined in the Tennessee Valley region, later settling in Central Illinois, where they lived on a medium-sized farm. My Great Grandfather passed away at 68 but my Great Grandmother remained active on the farm until she was 80 at which time she moved to a small home in Shelbyville, IL. She remained in that home until she fell off a ladder at 98, while picking peaches. She broken her elbow and was sent to a nursing home just blocks from her home. Known to "run away" to her "city" home she would often be found sitting in the yard dead heading flowers and tending her garden, unaware the home had been sold to someone else. My Great Grandmother passed away quietly in her sleep just

months shy of her 106th birthday. She never experienced any major illnesses or operations, remained cognitive until 103+ when her children (8 surviving) became too old to visit her. She continued to practice her indigenous homeopathic medicine her entire life. She was taught the ways as a young girl by her Father and Mother, the tribe's Healers. It was her knowledge of native plants, herbs and what we now call spices as well as the time she spent teaching me this knowledge that I most remember and cherish. She was a remarkable woman.

### Ingredients:

4 Chicken thighs skin removed, (fried crisp and finely chopped for garnish)
1 35oz can Hominy, drained, rinsed and air dried. (Regular

rinsed and air dried. (Regular frozen corn can be substituted)

2 bags frozen Lima Beans (can substitute red beans) 1 medium Butternut Squash, peeled and cubed

1 medium Green Pepper, diced 1 medium Onion, diced 4 TBS Fresh Sage, finely

chopped (saving 10-15 leaves to be fried and crumbled as garnish)

1 tsp Sumac 1 tsp Sea Salt 1 tsp fine Black Pepper 1/4 +/- tsp Ground Ancho Chili Pepper Oil of choice for frying

Remove skin from chicken if desired. Cut into strips to deep fry. Rinse and pat dry.

In a small bowl mix salt, pepper, sage, sumac and Ancho chili powder. Rub on both sides of chicken. Place chicken in heated skillet, skin side down if not removed. Cook on medium high for 15 minutes each side. Remove from pan and place in shallow container. Cover loosely with foil.

Turn heat down to medium. Add onions and peppers to skillet. Stir for two minutes. Add beans (if using frozen Lima beans. cook for 5-6 minutes.) Stir as needed to keep from sticking. Add squash. Cook same as beans. Add hominy. Cook for 5-6 minutes. Add chicken back to pan. Reduce heat and cover. Let cook for approximately 10 minutes on low/medium heat or until chicken is done next to bone. Gently stir in remaining seasoning mixture. Remove from pan and serve on a platter or shallow dish. Top with chopped, deep fried chicken skins and fried sage leaves (or fresh) as garnish and serve. Makes 4 servings.

### GREEN COMMITTEE

### STEPHANIE BRAUNSTEIN AND KAREN APRILL, CO-CHAIRS



A green worldview is no longer the exclusive province of those who live an alternative lifestyle. It is now an imperative for all who want to ensure that this planet continues to support our human existence as well as the existences of the plants and animals with whom we share the earth—and depend upon for our lives, literally.

Similarly, while the original Rainberry Bay Green Committee focused primarily on recycling efforts, it now must expand its concerns to include a variety of initiatives that will help preserve our planet's air, water, and soil. Any effort, no matter how small, to support the ecosystems we depend upon for our health and well being must be made.

To this end, several years ago, the Green Committee promoted the landscape use of native plants over the use of exotics. While exotics can be lovely to look at, they do not support a green environment. Natives do not require the same levels of irrigation and other maintenance that the exotics doas in the use of chemical fertilizers and weed deterrents. Natives, once established, primarily only require pruning; and pruning does not leave toxic chemicals in our soil. Those toxic chemicals disrupt the delicate balance required to keep our soil safe and productive for all.

With this reality in mind, the Green Committee has a couple of projects in place:

The Green Committee in conjunction with the Landscape Committee, PBB, and FSR worked to remove the large Brazilian Pep-

per Trees located at the lake by Pool 5 and in front of the rush plants. The Brazilian pepper is an invasive plant that is on the State of Florida's prohibited plant list. They are members of the poison ivy family and can cause skin irritation. Keep an eye out for replacements that will be more appropriate for our community.

Also, in response to a generous donation from the 21st Century Club, the GC has been busy working with a landscaper, the Board, and the Bocce and Pickleball Clubs to plant gardens in the areas surrounding the clubs' courts. Careful research and analysis of the needs and requirements of these areas are in process, and the planting will hopefully begin soon.

### What we learned about white flies and ficus from Dennis Dezeeuw, Sustainscape and Dr. Brian Bahder, UFL/IFAS:

- Sap sucker white fly are attracted to specific plants
- The white fly is attracted to our Ficus benjamina first appeared in 2007
- Underside of ficus leaf is where the eggs and infestation occur
- General biology of our special white fly is unknown, so therefore tough to treat

### 3 treatment methods:

- ♦ Biological (beneficial insects eat the white fly, takes years for beneficials to show up)
- Horticultural oil (has been successfully used in Rainberry and other areas of Palm Beach County, however timing of spray is essential and must be sprayed under the leaf, but not enough data to determine when to treat and can be costly)
- Systemic Insecticide/Root Drench (method used in Rainberry for a few years, cheapest method using a neonic-imidacloprid; ficus roots are drenched sending poison thru the leaves killing the sap sucking white flies, does not kill pollinators because ficus is always trimmed before it blooms

### Solution:

Begin to replace ficus with a native "green wall" and avoid planting the same shrub everywhere. A Native Plant choice is essential for many reasons, including:

- Require few, if any pesticides, fertilizers, or watering after established
- Trim once a year
- Can be an "orderly" shape



### **CPAP TIPS**

**Backup Battery.** Most backup batteries will get you through a night or two without access to power. However, this may not be enough following particularly bad storms.

**Portable Power Supply** While CPAP backup batteries work well for a night or two without power, a portable generator may be worth investing in if you expect to be without power for multiple days. Make sure your portable power supply is fully charged and/or fueled before the storm.

**Distilled Water** It's important to only use distilled water in your CPAP humidifier because of the minerals present in other types of water, such as tap, filtered, and even spring water. Tap water is acceptable for CPAP in a pinch, but pay close attention to any safety announcements about your local water supply, such as boil water notices from your local county officials. If your water is not cleared for drinking, it should also not be used for the CPAP's humidifier or for cleaning your CPAP machine.

Waterless Cleaning Supplies It is essential to keep up with cleaning your CPAP equipment, despite the storm. Bacteria can begin growing within hours, while mold can arise after just one day. Mild soap and water are often enough for day-to-day upkeep. Here are a few options if you don't have access to water: Baby Wipes, Vinegar, CPAP Cleaning Wipes.

**Backup Supplies.** If you are scheduled to replace any of your CPAP equipment during hurricane season, we encourage you to stock up on essential CPAP supplies ahead of time, as these storms can sometimes impact delivery by days or even weeks.


# Say Hello to Hunter Eudy
