Rainberry Bay Master Homes and Villas will be holding their **ANNUAL MEETINGS & ELECTION OF BOARD MEMBERS** on Wednesday, March 6, 2019 in the Rainberry Theater. Election begins at 6:00 pm with the Annual Meeting following at 7:00 pm. **DEB PETERS** and her Committee have been hard at work searching for and interviewing potential candidates. Their task ended on January 16, 2019, Candidates Night.

Now your job begins. Bring your picture ID. Only one person per household may vote. If you have any questions about who you registered as the designated voter, call the office. They maintain the file of Certificates of Appointment. If you need to file a new one or yours needs to be updated, be certain to complete a new form with the office anytime in February.

The management office will be accepting absentee ballots via mail and drop-off until noon on Election Day. The ballot box remains in the office and remains locked until we open it to count the envelopes for quorums. The envelopes don't get opened until the election closes at 7:00 pm on March 6, 2019. Be certain that you sign ONLY the white, outside envelope. Unsigned envelopes will not be counted. Mark your outside envelope and your ballot clearly so there is no question who you voted for and only mark the number of candidates required. No write-ins are permitted.

This issue of the Beacon contains the resumes and important information about our candidates. Be sure to read them so we can vote intelligently. You will also find the resumes on the website, myrainberrybay.com. And please vote, either by absentee ballot (being mailed to you) or in person on election night. There is only one contest this year, for the Homes Association. Both Masters and Villas candidates will be confirmed at the Annual Meeting.

We need volunteers to register voters and count ballots. We had a great team last year (finished our counts in less than an hour). Looking forward to seeing a lot of you back. Just call or email me at 561.274.0868 or kr19wells@gmail.com if you want to help us out this year.



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
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Book Discussion Group



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Funny Name, Great Game!

Pickleball was invented in 1965 in Washington state. It was named after the "pickle boat" which was the last boat to come back to shore after the catch and was comprised of the crew members who were

the last to be chosen to work that day. Two years later, the inventor's dog was named Pickles, after the game was named.

Pickleball is a paddle sport that combines elements of table tennis, badminton and tennis. The court is only 20' x 44' making this an exciting volleying game. Many games finish within 15 minutes. Rainberry has 4 pickleball courts on tennis court 11 (a.k.a., Pickleball Park).

We are unique in that we figured out how to play on our softer surface (Har-Tru) vs hard asphalt courts that are being installed around us, for one-tenth the price. Our courts are less of an injury hazard than the hard courts and are easier to maintain. We play on Tuesday mornings at 9am and Tuesday night at 7pm. On Sunday Funday at 4pm, the players supply food and drink. Our instructional day is Thursday at 5:30 for beginners, followed by open play at 7pm.

Many beginners start playing games the same night right after their instruction with the other beginners. Friendships are established and phone numbers are exchanged to make up individual games other than open play times. So if you haven't exercised in a while and want to have fun doing it, come on out and try. Balls and paddles are supplied.

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
Meet Your Neighbor—Cal Askinazi

Cal was raised on the lower east side of Manhattan. He has a younger brother and sister. When he was thirteen years old his family moved to the East New York section of Brooklyn. At Thomas Jefferson High School, Cal discovered that he was a terrific swimmer. His high school coach encouraged him to try out for the Olympics, which he did. But, he said, "I didn't have a chance." He described the other swimmers as having such long arms that they reached from their shoulders to their knees! Their swim strokes were phenomenal. He still loves swimming but doesn't do it competitively.

As a young man Cal worked in his uncle's shop cutting drapes and bedspreads. When he was 25 years old he was living in a co-op in Rockaway with his wife, Marilyn, and their two sons. To get extra money, he drove a taxicab in New York City on weekends. He made more money in two days than he earned in his uncle's shop in a week. Cal was happier driving a cab than cutting fabrics. Marilyn and Cal's father encouraged him to drive a cab if that's what he preferred. Soon afterward, his father and sister lent him money to buy a New York City Medallion and a taxicab. Cal was able to repay his family and he and Marilyn bought a house in Lynbrook, Long Island.

From Lynbrook, Cal drove his cab for twenty years in New York City. He drove twelve to fourteen hours a day. He was forever dealing with people, traffic and car problems. On one occasion, unbeknownst to him, a couple of men who had just robbed a bank hailed his cab. After about ten blocks, two police cars caught up with them and pinned his cab to the curb. The policemen drew their guns and took them to the police station in handcuffs. They thought Cal was one of the bank robbers. They questioned him for more than four hours before they let



him go. After Cal testified in court, the police gave him a letter, which he kept in his cab, that said he helped convict the bank robbers. Cal never got another ticket after that because all he had to do was show the letter and policemen honored his service.

On another trip, Cal picked up a man on 57th Street and 3rd Avenue who was in a hurry to get to Pennsylvania Station on 34th Street and 8th Avenue. Carol also sings in a choral group at the Jewish Community Center on Atlantic Avenue.

During the worst of his chemotherapy, Carol and Cal's sons kept him from quitting treatment and giving up. Cal feels fortunate for having his wonderful family. His philosophy of life has been to be a good man and to take care of his family. Now, they are showing their caring for him.

FAQ's

Q What are the rules for renting out a property in Rainberry Bay?

A. The property must be owned for 2 years or more. Rainberry's Rules restrict rentals to a minimum of 3 months, a maximum of 12 months. There may be only one rental per year. Annual rentals can be renewed (renewal applications need to be presented to the office). Renters must go through the application process which includes a background search, same as buyers. If you plan to rent your property you must also get a Landlord's permit through Delray Beach. This, or your application to DB for the permit, should be attached it to the rental application forms.

Q: What are the guidelines for trash, recycling and bulk pick-up? (See Rules for additional details.)

A. Trash pickup is scheduled for Tuesday and Friday mornings by Delray Beach Please use your rolling garbage cart if your sections uses those. Recycling needs to be placed in the yellow or blue bins for Tuesday morning pickup. The yellow bin is for paper including cardboard and magazines. The blue bin is for plastic #1-7 and metal. These containers may be placed out after 4 pm the evening before pickup and must be put back away by 11 pm the night of pickup. Bulk pickup is Friday and items should be placed curbside on Thursday, after 4 pm. This includes appliances, as well as vegetative waste including tree and bush cuttings which must be tied. For the Villas sections using the dumpsters, please make sure all your garbage is inside the dumpster so that the lid can close. Do not mix garbage with the recyclables which go in the blue and yellow dumpsters. Do not place bulk items alongside the dumpsters other than Thursday evening. In all cases, contractors must remove their debris.

Q: What is the deadline for the Capital Contribution ballot to be returned?

A. The deadline was January 4th, 90 days after the first ballot was returned, per statute. If you have not received a ballot or cannot locate the one you did receive, the office can provide a replacement. Stop by or call the office during regular hours - Monday—Friday, 8:30a - 4:30p.

Forward-Looking, and Timeless

Beethoven had a healthy – and it turns out – accurate estimation of the merit of his compositions. When a violinist complained that his Opus 59 quartets were "not music," the composer responded: "Oh, they are not for you, but for a later age." When the final movement of his Opus 130 quartet (the "Grosse Fuge") baffled its first listeners and led a critic to characterize it as "incomprehensible, like Chinese," Beethoven dismissed them as "cattle" and "asses." And when a friend told him, on his deathbed, that the fugue did not please its audience, he responded, "It will please them someday."

While the great majority of classical music was created in the past, the best is timeless and some even speaks to the future. We heard one wag offer the opinion years ago that Beethoven's late quartets were beyond the average WQXR listener, which is snarky but probably still true. And people are still digesting Debussy's *Pelleas et Melissande*, a brooding, dreamlike meditation based on Maurice Maeterlinck's symbolist play of the same name, which we are showing on February 1. 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Reduce, Repurpose

Ever wonder why Dawn soap is the wildlife cleaner of choice after an oil spill? Dawn effectively removes grease but does not cause harm to the skin of the birds. It's also biodegradable and contains no phosphates.

Merry Maids recommends using a drop of Dawn soap in 8 ounces of water to clean ceramic tile and nowax/linoleum floors. You can also use the spray on:

- Bathroom and kitchen counters and sinks
- Woodwork, like baseboards, shelves, and wainscoting (Make sure to dry as you go; wood doesn't like prolonged contact with water.)
- Tubs and toilet seats

Put a drop of Dawn dish soap in a spray bottle, fill the rest of the bottle with water, shake well, and mist your household plants with the soapy water to repel insects from your houseplants, including aphids, spider mites and mealy bugs.

If you have gasoline or motor oil stains on your driveway, first sprinkle kitty litter on the spot to absorb excess oil. Then use a scrub broom and a solution of biodegradable Dawn dish soap and warm water to safely and effectively remove excess motor oil from the pavement.

We're training him to do more to care for me, but we didn't learn I had epilepsy until a year after we got him.

I went after him after I had dusted off my jeans and my ego, and found him trying to get the attention of a very annoyed woman. She was swatting him away and telling him to go away. So I felt like I need to share this heads up.

If a service dog without a person approaches you, it means the person is down and in need of help.

Don't get scared, don't get annoyed, follow the dog! If it had been an emergency situation, I could have choked, I could have hit my head, I could have had so many things happen to me.

We are going to update his training so if the first person doesn't cooperate, he moves on. But seriously guys, you should know that a dog in a vest proclaiming it a service dog who approaches you without his human wants you to follow him."

This seems as good a reason to vest a service dog as any we have heard. The article was on the internet and something we hadn't heard in our meetings.
