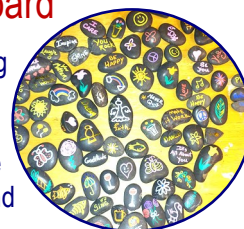

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PLAN TO SET UP A “NO-SPRAY” PROGRAM AT RAINBERRY BAY

PURPOSE:

Allows residents to request that no pesticides or glyphosate-based herbicides be sprayed in or spread on their planting beds by Rainberry Bay's landscaping company. However, the landscaping company will continue to treat Ficus for white fly by root-drench method and treat turf as well as trees that are diseased. Unless indicated by the presence of red reflectors, the landscaping company will also continue to mow, trim hedges, and do other tasks as contracted by the Rainberry Bay HOA.

SCOPE:

This proposal, when passed, will be in place for one year. After that period of time, the proposal will be reviewed before renewal.

PROCESS FOR RESIDENTS:

- Notify the office to fill out a work order that requests that no chemicals be applied to your property. This work order will be recorded in your account and passed on to our landscaping company by our property manager.
- By authorizing the above-mentioned work order, you are agreeing that PBBL is not responsible for any possible damages that may occur to your landscaping or your neighbors' landscaping as a result of not receiving regular spraying of pesticides or herbicides.
- Place a blue reflector (purchased by yourself) in whatever beds on your property you wish to prevent from being treated.
- **Note:** You will not receive a discount in your HOA fees when you opt-out of chemical application just as those who have private landscapers do not receive a discount.
- **Note:** You cannot control with what your neighbors' yards are treated.

RESIDENTS' RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Your beds must continue to be maintained to Rainberry Bay standards: The method you choose to maintain weed-free yards, driveways, sidewalks, and beds is your decision. You

can do the work yourself or contract with any landscaping company to use alternative methods for weed control.

- Residents who are not full-time (“snowbirds”), and who elect to be in the program, must delegate the oversight of their property to someone who is here full-time. Not being a full-time resident does not excuse you from keeping your property maintained to Rainberry Bay standards.
- If your plantings die, you will be responsible for replacing them. Residents will be cited if their yard becomes unsightly. If not promptly improved, the Rules Compliance Committee will first send one violation letter, and then fining will begin. Once the total of unpaid fines reaches \$1000, a lien will be put on the home, and it will be removed from the opt-out list. After that point, chemical spraying/spreading will resume.
- Once placed on this chemical-free list, you may request to have regular chemical treatment restarted, but you may not go back to a chemical-free property.
- The Department of Agriculture does have a statute for those with medical problems associated with pesticide spray. This is statute 482.2267. Registry of persons requiring prior notification of the application of pesticides. After completing the proper paperwork, Rainberry Bay's landscaping company will be notified. The landscaping company is then legally responsible to notify you 24 hours before the spraying is done. Please note that your yard will still be sprayed, the landscaping company is only required to notify you 24 hours before spraying is done. You will be notified by phone, email, or hangtag on door. This statute makes it clear that improper use/filing is a 2nd degree misdemeanor.
- This opt-out request covers only landscaping treatments from the HOA's current landscaping company. We also have an insect/pest control company treating our homes. There is no opt-out program for home pest control.

This proposal was supported by the Green Committee.

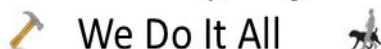

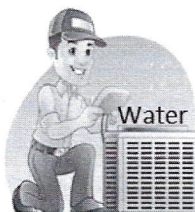
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MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR: FRUMA KLASS

FRUMA KLASS was a bright child who showed promise and independence from an early age. During her professional career, she was a prize-winning writer, an editor and an adjunct professor of English at Pennsylvania State University. But it all started at the age of three when she taught herself to read. Fruma also had to teach herself how to add numbers because she was skipped during the grades when arithmetic was being taught. She graduated from The Bronx High School of Science at the age of sixteen. It had been an all-boys school. She was accepted into the second graduating class in which a limited number of girls were accepted. All students still have to pass a stringent test to attend.

Following high school, Fruma enrolled in Brooklyn College as an English major. In her junior year she wrote a long paper on Dianetics, a type of do-it-yourself psychology. It was written by L. Ron Hubbard, a science fiction writer who became the future founder of the Church of Scientology. When her English teacher refused to accept her paper, Fruma rebelled and left college.

At nineteen, Fruma moved into a one room apartment in Greenwich Village. She became a fabric tester for Hart, Schaffner and Marx, a menswear manufacturer. Her job was to sew test strips onto pieces of fabric and see the results after laundering them. She was bored with the work and was fired after a year.

At the same time, Fruma attended a school to become a medical laboratory assistant. She got a job at Montefiore Hospital in the Bronx as a lab technician. She was assigned to work in the blood bank of the Department of Hematology.

When she was twenty-two, while working at Montefiore, she met and married her husband, Philip. He was a well-known, successful, science-fiction writer. He was attractive, Jewish, and fifteen years older than Fruma. Philip wrote under the name William Tenn. Initially her parents were against their marriage because of their age



difference but then, later on, accepted him. Fruma and Philip had an enduring, loving relationship which proved that they were meant for each other.

In the late sixties, Fruma and Philip left New York for State College, Pennsylvania, where Philip joined the faculty at Penn State as an associate professor in the English Department. Over the years as enrollment at the college grew, Fruma was offered a position in the English Department as an adjunct professor where she taught Freshman English for seven years.

In 1976, when Fruma was forty-two years old and Philip was fifty-seven, they adopted their four-day-old daughter, Adina. Fruma had changed jobs and worked for ten years as a copyeditor for medical journals.

When Philip reached Penn State's compulsory retirement age, they relocated to Mt. Lebanon, south of Pittsburgh. Moving was a challenge for Fruma because she had to learn how to drive. She said it was awful. They had a stick shift car. In her first snowstorm in their new home, the car wouldn't go up a hill. Suddenly she saw five guys run up to her car, which frightened her. But they ran to push her car up the hill! She said, "People in Mt. Lebanon were very nice."

When I asked Fruma about her

philosophy of life, she said, "Oy, I don't have one. Does everybody have one?"

When I asked her about what was most thrilling in her life, she said that adopting their daughter was the highlight of her existence. Nowadays, Adina lives nearby and helps Fruma with shopping and driving her to the library. Fruma absolutely doesn't like to read on electronic devices. She loves the feel and smell of paper books. Her house is full of bookcases and lots of books.

Now, at the age of eighty-six, Fruma doesn't seem to realize how accomplished she is. I borrowed two of her books which contain some of her writings. I had to swear that I would return them. I returned them. In 2004, she won an award for her submission to a worldwide essay competition. The theme was "The Power of Purpose." Her essay described how a starving Jewish family in a poor Polish-Ukrainian village managed to make their way to America, one family member at a time, starting around the year 1920. She wrote with compassion about the sacrifices these extended families made in order to leave a land that didn't want them.

Her first science fiction story was about how Noah and his family followed God's instructions on how to build the Ark and then launched the Ark before the flood. This was a sci-fi story that was set in the past. In the Ark, his family looked to Noah as their leader but they also shared their thoughts and anxieties as they observed the rain and rising waters during their journey. Fruma's imagination and love for the characters in the family made me feel right at home with them.

In 2010, when Fruma became widowed, she moved to Rainberry Bay to live two houses away from her older sister. She was happy that they were together again.

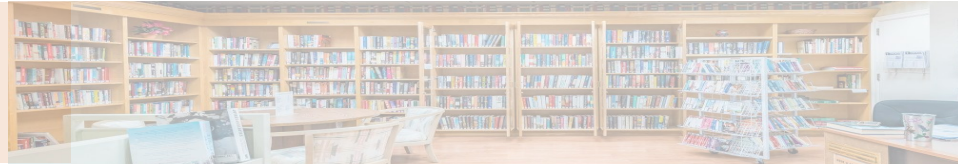
She is a bright comet in our midst.

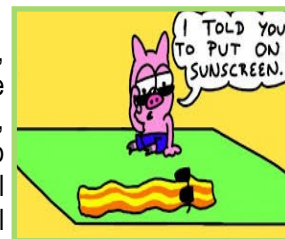

REPURPOSE:

DEALING WITH SUNBURN

Whether it's missing a spot, forgetting to reapply, or failing to notice that your sunscreen has expired, nobody's perfect when it comes to preventing sunburn. In these accidental cases there are a number of natural remedies to help heal the burn.



COOL, NOT COLD, WATER

Even something as simple as cool water can make a huge difference to those experiencing the burn. Sunburnt skin is implicitly irritated, so irritating it further via scrubbing, soap, bath oils, or the like, will only make matters worse.

OATMEAL

Oatmeal, is an old-school sunburn cure that allegedly works, and reduces the itching that occurs when sunburn starts to heal.

Try grinding up plain oats in your food processor and adding them directly to the tub. After mixing the water and oatmeal thoroughly, soak in cool bath water for 15 to 20 minutes and gently pat yourself dry.

COLD COMPRESS

In addition to cool water, you can also use a cold compress to reduce heat and bring down swelling. You can either use an ice pack or, a bag of frozen veggies wrapped in a soft towel, and apply it directly to the burn. If the compress is frozen, don't place it directly on the skin, and don't use it for more than 10 or 15 minutes at a time.

ALOE

There are dozens of conventional aloe-based creams, gels, and ointments on the market for healing or soothing sunburn, but the more natural thing to do would be to break off a chunk of an aloe plant and use what's inside. According to Healthline, the gel inside an aloe leaf, chilled and applied directly to the skin, is the most effective way to soothe sunburn. You can apply aloe vera a few times a day to help heal minor sunburns, but more severe burns might require intervention by a physician.

TEA

According to Prevention, the tannic acid found in green tea and black tea might be able to pull heat out of sunburns. Tea also contains catechins, antioxidant compounds that repair skin damage and promote healing. Chamomile tea is another fine choice and drinking it can soothe ragged nerves. To use, soak two tea bags in cool water, and then place them directly on sunburnt eyelids.

ANNUAL COLLECTION UPDATE

Due to your generosity with this year's annual collection, we have been able to donate \$975 each to Delray Beach Police and Fire Rescue Departments. The Police and Fire depts have expressed their sincerest gratitude for our donations.

The Police will purchase a small drone to assess situations before entering cars, stores, alleys or other questionable areas so they are not going into a situation 'blindly'.

The Fire Rescue Department will purchase two carbon monoxide (CO) detecting devices that helps to keep the firefighters and the public safe by detecting carbon monoxide in the air. These devices will give an advance warning of a potentially poisonous situation in a fire.

Preparing isn't difficult; it's about thinking ahead and getting organized. Our management team does a great job of preparing the common spaces of Rainberry Bay for an approaching hurricane. But it is up to each of us to prepare our own homes. What exactly does that mean? For the inside of your home and the people in it, preparation means stocking up on the things you will need for several days at a time: food, water, batteries, cash, gas in your car, protecting important documents and valuables. For the outside of your home it means having hurricane rated windows and doors and/or shutters, putting away all outside furniture, plants, barbecues and decorations, making sure garden debris is cleared regularly. Preparation equals peace of mind!

Join us for a presentation followed by Q & A on Thursday August 12th at 1:00 pm in the Men's Card Room of the Clubhouse. We hope it will be a great review for all but especially helpful if you are new to the area.

RB CERT TEAM

You might have heard of CERT yet have no idea what it means or what we do. The Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD) developed the CERT program after examining the civilian response to disasters in Mexico and Japan in 1985.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program is a nationally supported, locally implemented initiative that teaches people how to better prepare themselves for hazards that may affect their communities. CERT trains them in basic disaster response skills such as team organization, disaster medical operations, fire safety, and light search and rescue. Local CERT programs train and organize teams of volunteers to assist their families, neighbors, co-workers, and other community members during emergencies when professional responders may not be immediately available to provide assistance. Before, during, and after disasters, CERT volunteer teams perform basic response activities, including checking in on neighbors, distributing information to the public, supporting emergency operations centers, and helping to manage traffic and crowds. The ability for CERT volunteers to perform these activities frees up professional responders to focus their efforts on more complex, essential, and critical tasks. CERT volunteers also support their communities by organizing, promoting, and participating in emergency preparedness events, activities, and projects.

Rainberry Bay formed our CERT Team many years ago and have had the privilege of having the largest team in the city of Delray. The training and basic personal equipment are supplied free to us by Delray Beach Fire Rescue.

Over the years, we have been fortunate that we have not sustained major damage, although in 2005 we did get hit with hurricane Wilma. Most of Rainberry Bay lost electric power for as much as three weeks.

Since it is not a question of "IF" but "WHEN" we will get hit, our CERT team trains and holds refresher training to be ready to help ourselves and you, our neighbors, for when that time comes.

Rainberry Bay started with 140 members. Over time our numbers have dwindled to less than 30. That's why we need your help to make sure that we will be able to help all of our community in a timely and safe way.

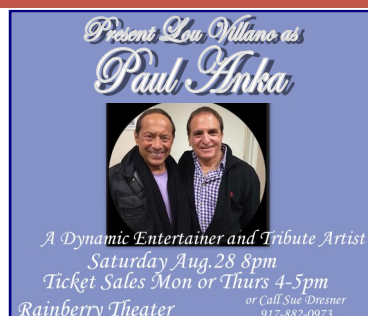

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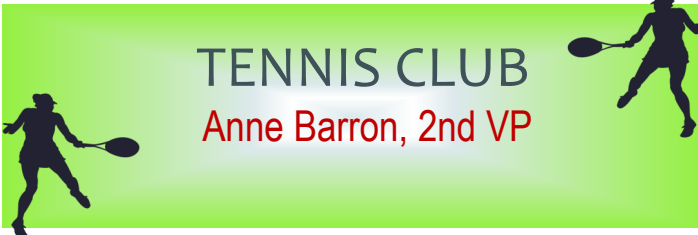

September 11th Snapshots

Sitting at my desk with a full cup of tea, doing my morning report.
A boom and a rocking feeling - someone joked about a dropped bowling ball.
Debris falling from the Trade Center, we grab jackets and bags.
A quick call home - I'm being evacuated.
Walking down the stairs. Standing in the street amazed at the flames shooting out.
A second plane, explosion, more fire.

Back up to get stragglers from our group - "*go home, get away*" I told them.
What to do? Where to go? Looking at shoes left in the street.
Sirens whooping, wailing. A cavalcade of official vehicles come towards us.
The officers move us along. My cousin works across the street - is he ok?

Cell phones died once the first tower went. Payphone lines twenty deep.
Keep trying to call my family - just to say "I'm safe."
Stopping to look at the fires - hearing screams, hiding my eyes as people jump.
Flames shooting out - twin candles on a cake lit by a monster.
A roar unlike anything I've ever heard and the building begins to come down.
I HAVE TO GET AWAY FROM HERE. I can't watch any longer
My heart is hurting - did my friend escape from the 65th floor?
Those poor people.

Walking North watching amazed, shocked, scared, shaking, crying New Yorkers.
People huddled around parked cars with radios blasting.
We hear that planes are down in Washington and Pennsylvania.
We're astonished, hurting.
A co-worker paces in the street - did his wife make it out alive?

Walking, walking, walking. No subways - we can walk across town.
We can walk across a bridge. Still no phone. Are my friends who live nearby home?
I feel like an extra in a Stephen King movie. I see a Red Cross ambulance with blown out windows.
Grey dust trails behind it.
Finally we stop at another building, make calls, find out the train has started to run.
I'm home - I'm safe - I'm sure things will never be the same.



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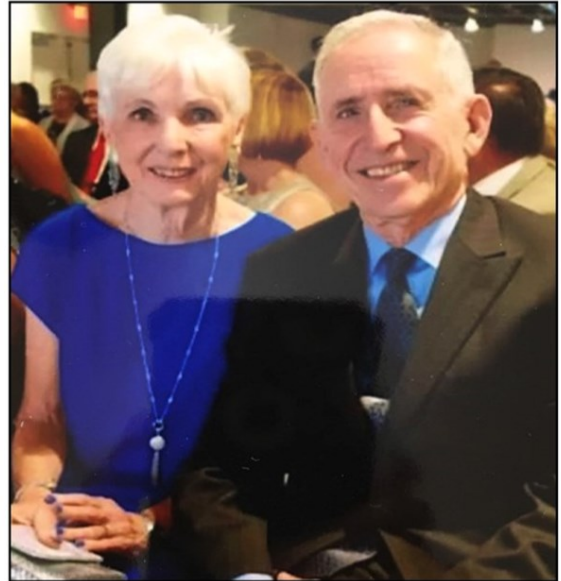

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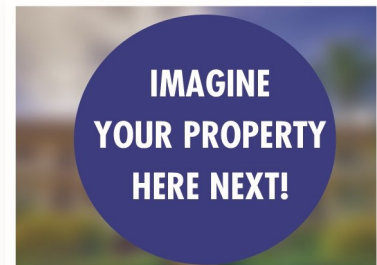
