THE CLOSED CIRCLE

What do the addresses 731 NW 24th Avenue and 712 NW 25th Avenue represent?

"Oh," you say, "19 digits and one avenue away." But there's more to it than that, for they also represent number one and number 901; the first and last houses to be purchased here in Rainberry Bay.

731 belong[ed] to Elynore Golden, Rainberry Bay's first resident. She and her late husband Bob moved here in February 1978 when nothing existed other than dirt roads and scrubby trees. They were looking for a quiet place in which to retire from their home in Cherry Hill, New Jersey. Like real pioneers, they gathered with the residents who followed them to form a community. Elynore recognized the need for people to get to know each other, so she planned beach parties, picnics, and dances. These had to be held outdoors since there was no clubhouse or theater. From this evolved our 'Social Club.'

Then came the need to notify people of these activities, so Elynore published a one-page newsletter. As the need to include more news increased, this one-page paper grew to become 'The Beacon' in 1979 with Elynore at the helm. In the midst of all this, Elynore found time for her painting, her classes, and her family.

By the time the Endicks bought the house at 712 NW 25th, in November 1989, the community was thriving and they were able to take advantage of the many activities that were awaiting them, like tennis, travel groups, Men's Club, canasta and lots of classes.

Now the circle has been closed and our community has been completed. Every year there are changes but our first citizen, Elynore Golden, has passed on a legacy to our residents with The Beacon that continues to enrich our lives.

Note: Elynore Golden sold her home to its present owner in March, 1995. The Endicks sold their home in August, 2003.

By the time you read this September will be (nearly) over and seasonal residents will be returning.

So much is happening in Rainberry Bay. Our roads project had barely begun when there was a concrete delivery issue (it was not available!) so we lost a bit of time but things are in full swing again. All streets in the community will be restored (they will dig approximately 1 ½ inches) and then replace the road asphalt. We will make every effort to keep residents informed when work will impact their sections and ask for everyone's patience when temporary inconveniences occur. It's a year-long project so hang on for more and continuing information. The road project is set up so that we pay as each section is completed. Your money is safely in the bank awaiting the invoices.

The work on the bathrooms for pools 1-4 should begin very soon. The finishing touches are being worked on in terms of choosing colors for counters, light fixtures, etc. No major work is being done, just a "spit and polish" on the existing layout, but you should notice them looking fresher and more modern.

Pool #5 and theater bathrooms will be scheduled for some time next year as well as painting the theater. In other areas, the pickleball and tennis courts are being refreshed and new windscreens will be installed as soon as hurricane season is over. Bocce courts will be next in line for court work and a new storage area for supplies and equipment has been ordered. The gym will get a new paint job soon and the adjacent weight room is now complete.

The budget is being worked on. The boards are all taking a cautious look at what we can plan for short term and long term. With items like electricity up 9% and all contractual obligations increasing, we are taking a long, hard look at what is extraneous. We are a 43-year-old community and the infrastructure keeps giving us reminders in the form of pool leaks, sinkholes, and roof leaks. We are prioritizing the work and moving as quickly as possible, although supply delays and worker shortages are a constant challenge.

The Council of Clubs has begun the seasonal meetings and hopefully all the other clubs and committees are doing the same. It sounds like this will be a fun and busy year for everyone.

The easiest thing to do is to contact the appropriate chairperson or liaison, found in the Beacon, and let them know what your issue is. Phone calls or emails are the easiest ways.

Use the website: www:myrainberrybay.com to process your work order if you can. Otherwise, call the Office. Explain to them clearly what the issue is in detail.

Do not contact the vendor or the workers. If everyone stopped them stop from what they were doing, they would never complete the service in time. This is another reason why they fall behind. Some issues take more time to resolve than others.

Those of us on the Homes Board work very closely with our vendors. We are trying to improve things at Rainberry.

New Documents are being drafted, new colors for your homes are being considered, and the list goes on.

If you don't like something, join a committee and help make a change.







It's time for me to step back from the Beacon but I'm still here, playing and teaching canasta, and as interested in everyone as ever.



As we are in the 2022 Hurricane season, your Rainberry Bay CERT team has been preparing to help our community should we be needed. This year our preparation must go where no one has gone before. Not only do we face the challenges of dealing with the aftermath of a disaster with limited resources and members, we now have to factor in the COVID-19 epidemic.

In past years, part of the clubhouse remained open for residents to come if they lost power. Due to the pandemic, once CERT sets up our Incident Command Post and Triage Area, the entire clubhouse will be off-limits. This measure is needed to ensure the risk of contamination and/or cross-contamination be held to a minimum. As it is, CERT is not and has not been trained or prepared to deal with the pandemic. If people are allowed to come and go, the chances of contamination will rise exponentially and it will put all the volunteers in danger, forcing the closing of the triage area, staging area, and Command Center.

Yes, these are troubling times, and some extreme measures are being considered and revamped in order to deal with a disaster. Your CERT team cannot and will not put ourselves in danger if security measures put in place are broken. We just don't have enough volunteers to cover this entire community.

We are fortunate in Rainberry Bay to have retired nurses and retired first responders as part of our team, all of whom are willing to run toward the impending disaster. We count on you, our Rainberry Bay family, to support us by not placing us in further danger and think about the safety of others.

HURRICANE EDUCATION

The only thing we can truly count on in hurricane season is that it is unpredictable! We've been lucky so far (as of September 12) but we are in the peak of the season and anything is possible.

So it's time to take stock (again) of your preparedness. While you may know how to shop and prepare your home, it can be challenging to find info on evacuation and shelters. What would you do if evacuation were needed or your power went out for an extended period?

SPECIAL NEEDS AND MEDICAL EQUIPMENT:

If you use oxygen, cpap machine, nebulizer or depend on other medical device, consider speaking with your doctor, family, or caregiver about what you will need. Some people opt for a generator or a rechargeable battery pack that can be on standby for power outages.

INTERESTED IN COMMUNITY SAFETY?

FACT: The Delray Beach Police Department is reviewing its partnership with the Delray Beach volunteers, including the COP (Citizens Observer Patrol) program. Traditionally, before the pandemic, COP volunteers worked in six communities within Delray Beach, acting as the eyes and ears for the Police Department in the neighborhoods where they live. COP volunteers play a significant role in supporting the members of the Delray Beach Police Department. They have been directly responsible for reducing crime in their areas by as much as 75%. This Police-driven alliance has improved the overall quality of life for all of us who live in Delray Beach. All COP volunteers are equipped with uniforms and a Police Volunteer vehicle.

FACT: The Delray Beach Police has recently informed us that they hope to authorize the patrolling of the COP program within the next few months. That means that Rainberry Bay volunteers in partnership with our colleagues from Rainberry Lake and the Pines will be resuming patrolling as soon as our volunteer police vehicle is available.

We need more volunteers in Rainberry Bay, and we hope we can count on you. Our Rainberry Bay volunteers patrol in five assigned nearby communities of Delray Beach, on a two-hour long shift, with a minimum commitment of one shift per week. The five communities that we are patrolling are Rainberry Bay, Rainberry Lake, the Pines, the shopping center at the corner of Lake Ida and Congress Avenues, and Lake Ida Park (aka the "dog park").

SPECIAL NEEDS SHELTER CRITERIA

- Persons who cannot be without electricity because they depend upon their own electrically energized life support equipment within the home (i.e. oxygen, nebulizers, G/NG Tubes, uncomplicated IV, etc).
- Persons that require assistance with transferring or need a Hoyer Lift.
- Persons receiving assistance with activities of daily living who need a place to evacuate with their caregiver.
- Persons who with progressive Alzheimer's or Dementia who need a place to evacuate with their caregiver. Caregivers must accompany their patients.

If you do not have special needs but feel

the need to leave, have a "to-go" bag ready. https://www.nytimes.com/2021/09/02/well/gobag-essentials.html

General shelters require you to bring all of your own supplies and bedding and may not be the best place to be for any extended time. The closest shelter is the high school on Atlantic Ave. in Delray Beach. Consider leaving the area well in advance of a category 3-5 hurricane to avoid the traffic, find a hotel or motel out of the track of the storm or perhaps visit friends or relatives out of state.





FLORIDA NATIVE HEDGES CAN BENEFIT RAINBERRY BAY'S FUTURE

Rainberry's ficus boundary hedges are slowly dying, expensive to trim and require expensive, harmful pesticides to kill the white fly. The Green Committee has spent the last 5 years researching, and planting in our own yards, better hedge choices. Simpson Stopper (myrcianthes fragrans) is a highly recommended, native choice for Rainberry residents to choose for replacing ficus hedges. Once established, these natives will require less trimming and no toxic treatment, saving our community money, saving our health and our pets health, as well as beautifying our community and attracting birds and pollinators.

We have 5 1/2 miles of Ficus around our perimeter and in our yards. Our contract fee for the last three years was \$889,000 per year for landscapers, which included trimming the ficus 6-9 times a year, depending on their location. An additional fee of \$20,000 was paid for the toxic root drench method of poison that kills white flies (and any other insects that come in contact with the treatment) as needed, at least once per year.

Dying ficus are currently being replaced with either green arboricola (schefflera arboricola) or clusia, which is an additional cost to our community for each planting. The green arboricola planted on Davis Road in 2018 was at a cost of \$15,000. A huge reason that white fly has taken over is because we have a monoculture of ficus all over Florida. Our community is planting and proposes to continue planting "green arbs" along with clusia. Green arboricola are a Florida—friendly shrub, but they are now another monoculture all over Florida. Clusia are known to be invasive, acting like the strangler fig, and are another Florida monoculture. Rainberry even has some trees growing out of clusia.

We can have crucial diversity, along with conformity of appearance, with native choices. The Native Plant experts that the Green Committee has hired to assess our options have suggested many native choices. The most common is Simpson Stopper (Myrcianthes fragrans). There are many other good choices, including Crabwood (Gymnathes lucida) and Florida Boxwood (Schaefferia frutescens).

MONOCULTURE

 - Please continue to save old eye glasses and contact lenses, including bubble cases, for collection at a time and place to be determined.
 - Tennis balls can be recycled in the box available at the tennis center.
- BLUE REFLECTORS: Please consider keeping our landscaping company from applying pesticides, herbicides, and fertilizers on your planting beds by signing up for the blue reflector program. The protocol and registration form are available in the kiosk at the Clubhouse. This is a beginning to keep some of the toxic chemicals out of our environment.

FALL- LANDSCAPE MANAGEMENT

DENNIS BRADLEY

In anticipation of the forthcoming Fall Season, it is important that we prepare. Preparation requires us to take a close look at all fundamental aspects of our landscape. Flowers & mulch are the most effective at punching up our curb appeal.

- Mulch serves to provide three primary benefits, aesthetic improvement, moisture retention, and reduction of weed growth. The thickness of the mulch applied is very important. If no mulch is present the industry standard is a static 2"-3" thick layer of mulch. Once you have a mulch base, a supplemental installation of 2" once or twice per year shall suffice.
- Annual flower plantings can do more to punch up our curb appeal than any other single enhancement we can provide. Proper color selection, design and strategic placement of color beds must also be considered.
- Entrance features to communities and all

amenity areas should take precedence when planning your design strategy. For large format color beds, solids or two-color combos create the most out your color program. Failure to amend and fertilize color beds will result in unwelcomed poor performance and subsequent losses.

We must give consideration to the balance of our landscape. This is a great time to trim, prune and adjust our landscape beds to ensure our intended design maintains integrity. While doing so, we should also take time to identify any deficient areas that may require filling in with additional shrubs or groundcover. Filling in all deficient areas is always recommended prior to the Fall mulching. Ideally, forecasting annual landscape replacement budgets will help a great deal when planning this effort.

In preparation for the forthcoming Winter season, fertilization should be prioritized, This supplemental feeding will boost your

landscapes immune system and naturally boost color & vigor. While not a guarantee against possible frost damage, it will aid to minimize both Initial damage and Improve recovery time.

Fundamentally, the transition from Spring/Summer season to our Fall/ Winter season can bring some welcomed changes. We will begin to see some dramatic changes. Days shall become both shorter & cooler. Therefore, all aspects of plant growth shall slow down. Additionally, rainfall shall also diminish providing a welcomed decline in plant pest and disease issues.

LFT'S GO NATIVE

AN EXCERPT FROM THE DECEMBER, 1985 BEACON

"The climate in South Florida is changing! The need for water conservation has reached the emergency level and population growth will depend on the availability of fresh water."

"Ecologists beg us to use plants which need less water. The search for native plants which will survive in our particular environment has become a popular pursuit. Homeowners must look further than K Mart, but the rewards in saving water, energy and maintenance can be important. Because our climate is more arid than before, even native plants will need help with feeding and watering to get them established, but once on their way, they will fend for themselves.

I have listed for you a few trees carefully selected for the native community of Pine

Flatwoods (the ecological name for this area of Delray Beach). Much information is available in the public library also."

Does any of this sound familiar to you? These are direct quotes from an article in the December 1985 Beacon, written by Adele Jackel. For 37 years, at least, we have recognized the need for different plantings here at Rainberry Bay to help the environment. The current Green Committee has done an incredible job educating and introducing us to the importance of replacing our invasive plants with natives.

Adele goes on to name 3 examples of trees that are beneficial to our community. Her examples of good trees for us are: Mahogany, Pigeon Plum and Cabbage Palm (aka Sabal

Palmetto). We do have a number of mahogany trees and found them to be a hazard to our cars, dropping nuts and seed pods that break windows.

What about the Sabal Palmettos and Pigeon Plums? Ms. Jackel tells us that the Palmetto is found growing wild throughout the state and is used in home landscape as well. The stems of the cabbage palm leaves remain attached after the leaf has broken away, and eventually falls off. How many of these do we see here today? Do we have any Pigeon Plum trees? We are in the process of removing the invasive schefflera and the Green Committee recommends replacing our high maintenance ficus. Be sure to read the article on the previous page.

CLUB SODA NOT JUST FOR DRINKING ANYMORE!

Pool water can cause discoloration to your hair, especially if your hair is color-treated. Use a can of club soda to rinse your hair after a swim to help protect it from discoloration.

♦ SOOTHE AN UPSET STOMACH

Sipping on club soda can help calm an upset stomach in two ways. First, the sodium bicarbonate in club soda can help neutralize stomach acid, and second, the carbonation encourages burping, which can help relieve some of the pressure in your stomach.

♦ RUST REMOVER

To help remove rust, soak the rusty object in club soda for an hour or two. The bubbling action of the carbonation will help loosen up the rust and make it easier to remove.

♦ PAN SAVER

Instead of trying to scrub a stubborn, cooked-on mess from a pot or pan, do a soak with club soda to make it easier! While the pot or pan is still warm, pour club soda into the pan and let it soak for a few hours. When you return, the mess should be much easier to clean!

♦ FEED YOUR PLANTS

Club soda's added minerals makes it a great food source for plants! Let a can or cup of club soda go flat, then use it to water your houseplants. Do this once a week to give your houseplants a nutritional boost!

Taking a self-care break and finding things that entertain you can feel like a luxury, but for the sake of your health, it's essential. Even 15 minutes a day to do something that makes you laugh could help you live well during retirement. Or, if nothing strikes you as funny, just force a fake laugh and see what happens. Here are some health benefits of laughter:

- RELIEVES PAIN: True laughter releases endorphins. One effect of the release of this hormone is that it increases pain tolerance. One study had participants watch 15 minutes of a comedy show in a group. Their pain tolerance increased 10% more than before the laughter. For those who watched a comedy show alone rather than with others, their pain tolerance also increased, but it was slightly less than 10%.
- 2. **HELPS YOUR HEART:** A good guffaw is healthy for your heart. It helps your heart by increasing the amount of oxygen in your blood and kicking up your heart rate. It also decreases arterial wall stiffness—a link to cardiovascular disease.
- 3. **BOOSTS YOUR IMMUNE SYSTEM:** Laughing can help you stay safe from viruses by improving your immune system. Laughing releases more anti-infection antibodies to help protect your body from infection.
- MAKES YOU HAPPIER: Laughing helps lighten your mood. It can lessen chronic depression and anxiety as well as make it easier to cope with challenging situations
- 5. REDUCES STRESS: Your body releases cortisol when you're stressed. Because it's known as the stress hormone, cortisol gets a bad rap, but it plays an important role in the body. It helps manage blood sugar levels, reduces inflammation, manages metabolism, and triggers the fight or flight response in your body at critical times. But too much cortisol and your body feels that stress. Laughter is one of the ways your body can help regulate cortisol. Laughing increases your oxygen intake, which stimulates body circulation and decreases your cortisol levels. Some studies show that just the act of laughing—without having humor in it—can have positive stress-relieving effects.
- RELAXES YOUR BODY: Stress causes your muscles to tense up. Laughing can help relieve stress because it relaxes your muscles. A good laugh can relieve your muscles of extra stress for up to 45 minutes because it stimulates circulation.

From Florida law: Lighting Requirements for Bicycles in Florida

Florida's bicycle law requires the following lighting on any bicycle operated between sunset and sunrise:

- A lamp on the front of the bicycle. The lamp must project white light that can be seen from at least 500 feet away.
- ♦ A lamp on the rear of the bicycle. This lamp must project red light that can be seen from at least 600 feet away.
- A red reflector on the rear of the bicycle. The reflector must also exhibit red light that is visible from at least 600 feet away.
- Additional lighting is permitted and highly recommended.

For more, see Section 316.2065(7) in the Florida Statutes.

IS IT LEGAL TO RIDE A BIKE ON A SIDEWALK IN FLORIDA?

Even though bicycles are considered vehicles under Florida law and are allowed to ride on the road, some cyclists prefer to use sidewalks. Where sidewalks are available, they may provide greater safety or accessibility for bikers who are uncomfortable with roadways


As a general matter, it is legal to ride a bike on a sidewalk in Florida. However, cyclists should note that as long as they are biking on a sidewalk or in a crosswalk, they have all the same responsibilities as pedestrians.

Additionally, the bicyclists must always yield the right-of-way to any other pedestrians while in a sidewalk or crosswalk. Bikers must also provide an audible signal before passing foot pedestrians.

IS IT LEGAL TO LISTEN TO MUSIC OR WEAR A HEADSET WHILE BIKING IN FLORIDA?

Auditory distractions inhibit safe driving. When you can't hear what's going on around you, you might miss out on important dues of impending danger. Accordingly, Florida's bicycle law prohibits the use of headphones, earbuds, headsets, and other listening devices while riding. An exception is made for hearing aids.
