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

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FROM THE MASTER BOARD

Each hurricane is a learning lesson. They are not "one size fits all." Each storm is different in size and intensity.

Dorian was monstrous and moved slower than most of us could walk.

That being said, some things remain the same. Your CERT team, small as it is, will gather and be prepared to help our neighbors. Management will have the clubhouse set up – a room for triage for medical care should it be needed, and a room for the Communication Team and Incident Commanders to meet and keep track of any damage or medical issues to be reported to the Delray Beach Fire Department until we're issued an "ALL CLEAR."

The clubhouse and theater will be ready should they be needed but they are NOT shelters. They are not hurricane-proofed. If, as with Irma, houses have no power, residents will be invited to come cool off and charge their phones. If coffee is served, it is a courtesy, not a requirement. If refreshments are made available, thank your neighbors who are donating them. If the clubhouse does not lose power, then it will all be air conditioned but not all rooms will be available. If it does lose power and is working under generator power then only 2 rooms will be cooled and not all outlets will be working.

Pools are closed, even if it is a sunny day. Why? In preparation for the storm, pumps are shut down and the water is no longer being checked for the proper chemical balance. Debris will likely blow in the pools which can make them unsafe and unhealthy. Once the pool company comes back it takes about 24 hours for the pumps to circulate the chemicals to restore balance. You will know they are safe once the locks are removed.

Management also removes the canvas awnings in the tennis center and at the pools so they don't get destroyed in the wind. The arms are removed from the entry gates, the Riviera gate is locked. Chairs are removed from around the pools so they don't get blown in the wind. These are just a few things done in preparation.

And for our residents: landscaping should be kept to a minimum just before or a storm and keep in mind that garbage, recycling and bulk pick-ups will likely be stopped. Do not put yard waste at the curb as it will be blown about in the winds. In the Villas area with dumpsters - please keep your garbage inside if the dumpsters are full. Recycling dumpsters are moved so they don't fly in the wind - so hang onto recycling until the next pick-up is scheduled. Please make sure any and all possible projectiles are removed from around your home. Shutters are to be put up and removed by residents get help if you need it! Any plywood that is used should be removed after the storm has left our area - it's for your safety!



FROM THE HOMES BOARD: YOUR VOTE REALLY COUNTS! Rhona Campton

I know that we are all aware of how important

it is to vote for our political leaders, but it is equally important to remember how important it is to vote on local issues that impact you and your life directly. What I am referring to specifically is the recent vote that was held by Homes Association to pass two vital amendments to our documents.

Florida Statute 720 gives us 90 days from the date of the special meeting set up to explain what we were trying to accomplish. This meeting was held on May 15th, which gave us a deadline for final vote tally of August 14th, 2019 to obtain the necessary affirmative votes to pass. Currently our Homes Documents require a 67% affirmative votewhich translates to 379 affirmative votes. Unfortunately, despite tremendous efforts by Homes Board members and a group of dedicated volunteers who called homeowners to remind them, we were unable to obtain the requisite number of votes required to pass these very important amendments.

However we came SO close! Total votes cast were 342- and almost all were in agreement to pass these. We had 339 Yesses on Amendment 1 and 325 Yesses on amendment 2. If Homes had the same voting rules as the Master and Villas Associations, which each use a simple majority (50% plus one), both of these amendments would have passed with flying colors! We will now have to restart the process all over again, starting with another special meeting and another 90 day window to obtain the requisite 379 affirmative votes!

A quick review of why this is so important to us. The first amendment is one that will bring our documents current with Florida Statute 720. The statute was changed to enable HOA's to collect ALL past due assessments, including late fees and attorney's fees from financial institutions when a mortgage foreclosure is completed. Our documents currently only allow us to collect one year of unpaid dues. Just to put this in perspective, we have a number of properties that are in foreclosure that are several years in arrears on dues! This costs each and every one of us money!

We need to make up the difference. That can mean as much as \$20,000 on one foreclosure! That equates to the cost of one roof that wouldn't have to be taken from reserves! The law is on our side, but we need to make sure our documents reflect the lawnot an outdated version of it.

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Meet Your Neighbor

RUTH TRIMMER Phyllis Berke

Ruth started out as a dancer in New York. She also worked as a casino host in Atlantic City for many years and returned to dancing when she moved to Florida in 2004. Ruth is a down to earth person who was engaged in many different glamorous jobs. As a showgirl in Manhattan nightclubs, she wore beautiful exotic costumes. As a casino host in Atlantic City she handed out perks to high rollers. You can recognize Ruth by her sparkle and irresistible smile.

At the age of eighteen, Ruth became a dancer in a troupe called the Manhattan Rockets. She toured with the troupe in many state fairs all over the country. The troupe appeared once in Madison Square Garden and once in Lincoln, Nebraska at a tricentennial celebration in Johnny Carson's hometown. A year later Ruth moved to Manhattan. Between dance engagements, Ruth worked as a temp for employment agencies. Fortunately for Ruth, her roommate, Donna, injured her knee dancing in the chorus of Lou Walters' Latin Quarter, a popular nightclub in Manhattan. Ruth was hired as Donna's temporary replacement. She then replaced another injured dancer in the show at the Latin Quarter for six months. Ruth was then hired to dance in Lou Walters' road show. By the way, Lou Walters was TV personality Barbara Walters' father.

After that, she was a showgirl at Jules Podell's Copacabana night club in Manhattan for nine months. When that ended, Ruth danced in an Off Broadway burlesque show for two and a half years starring Ann Corio, a well-known stripper. In case you were wondering, Ruth was not a stripper. She just danced. Ruth loved the exciting life of a showgirl and remains friends with many of her contemporaries after all those years.

Ruth and her family were brought to a suburb of Trenton from Germany after World War II by the Jewish Family Service when she was four years old. She attended a Hebrew grade school with five classmates, all from Europe. When her parents moved to Trenton proper, Ruth and



her younger sister attended public schools. Ruth took dancing lessons and was great at it. Upon graduation from high school, she auditioned with the Manhattan Rockettes and got the job.

Ruth took time off from dancing when she married and became pregnant with their son. A few years later, with the idea of becoming a showgirl again, Ruth moved to Atlantic City. She took a job at a bank, but that was not exciting enough for her. She applied for work at the Playboy Club Casino in 1980 and found a new career that she loved.

In order to work as a Casino Host, Ruth had to pay \$1,400 to apply for a license from the State Division of Gaming Enforcement. An agent went to her home, checked her finances, looked inside her safe deposit box and verified her history. While waiting for her license to arrive, Ruth worked as a cage cashier. She graduated as a junior casino host.

"Does a casino host wear frilly dresses and bring patrons free drinks?" I asked. Far from it, I learned. She wore a business suit which prominently displayed her license from the gaming division. This was the casino's uniform. She would go to the pit boss who introduced her to the high rollers also known as quality players. A pit boss supervises two to four dealers at the card tables. If a patron wanted to change a big bill or cash in a large amount of chips, the dealer had to notify the pit boss.

Basically, Ruth acted as a public relations person for the casino. She would offer a big money player the opportunity to get a free room, drinks, food and tickets for shows. If he or she was interested in these perks, Ruth would help the big spender to pick up a Player Card from the casino's service desk. Management could then track the gambler's spending. The gambler had to present this card before every bet. From 1986 to 1994 Ruth worked at Trump Plaza as a full-fledged casino host. Is that a dream job or what?

In 1994 for three years Ruth became a partner in a casino in Colorado. She sold out when she had the opportunity to become a flight attendant with a charter company which ran junkets to Atlantic City. The charter flights were sponsored by several Atlantic City casinos, like Harrah's and Caesar's. She loved this job which lasted seven years until she moved to Florida.

When she moved to Florida in 2004 Ruth danced as a showgirl again. For fourteen years she danced with the Original Florida Follies in Florida. The Follies raised money for children's charities. She is grateful to Cathy Dooley for founding the Follies which contributed to children's wellbeing. The Follies showgirls were all senior citizens. They dressed in fabulous costumes with huge Vegas style head dresses. Many of the Follies dancers began their careers in New York City. They were a lively and glamorous bunch.

Thank you, Ruth, for bringing your sparkle to Rainberry Bay. We're glad you're not bored with us after all the glamor in your life.

DRAINAGE FACTS FROM LAKE WORTH DRAINAGE DISTRICT (LWDD) Robert Cohen

These Fast Facts are provided to clear up some misunderstandings in Rainberry Bay.

Our lake, based on advice from our LWDD inspector, is currently being maintained at its design level to provide proper FLOOD CONTROL.

Fast Facts 2 and 3 DO NOT APPLY to Rainberry Bay because the Discharge Control Structure (DCS) is Fixed and Not Operable despite the installed steel plates which LWDD does not understand. And, our DCS contains a "backwater valve" to prevent canal water entering our lake IF the canal got flooded.

"Older Communities" means those with drainage designed BEFORE 1972, i.e. King's Point. Rainberry's was designed in 1977-78.

We do not take any water FROM the canal system. And, per 1972 rules, ALL of our storm drains go to the lake and never directly to the canal. The following **SEVEN FAST FACTS** will help get property owners started on becoming better informed partners in providing flood control.

• Fast Fact 1: The association or neighborhood drainage system is always operating. Stormwater continually discharges from lake systems until the designed water elevation is achieved.

Fast Fact 2: The association cannot open its discharge control structure without authorization from LWDD. Doing so can put the community in jeopardy because canal water may backflow into lake systems.

Fast Fact 3: LWDD autorization to open a discharge control structure is only given under emergency conditions and when LWDD canale are able to accept the additional increase of stormwater.

Fast Fact 4: Severe flooding most often occurs in older communities without modern stormwater systems, neighborhoods with poor maintenance practices and when rainfall exceeds the drainage design.

► Fast Fact 5: The association or neighborhood drainage system discharges into LWDD canals which discharge into South Florida Water Management District canals. These 3 groups work together to capture and hold stormwater and coordinate discharges at safe and appropriate times. Fast Fact 6: Potential rainfall effects within LWDD:

- ⇒ 5-6 inches of rainfall in a 24 hour period, expect standing water in yards, swales and ditches. Crowns of community road should remain dry and passable.
- ⇒ 7-9 inches of rainfall in a 72 hour period, expect community swales, roads, lawns and driveways, including garages to flood as designed. Finished floors of houses should remain dry.
- ⇒ 15-23 inches or more of rainfall in a 72 hour period, expect that some houses and businesses may experience finished floor flooding.

Fast Fact 7: Property owners can help. Avoid placing trash bags or landscape debris in swale areas or on top of storm drains. Do not throw trash into lakes or canals which can cause blockages. Never plant or place encroachments in the canal right-of-way which can restrict access and cause delays for emergency response.

NEW COMCAST/XFINITY CONTRACT Lois Wiesler

Our Comcast Committee has been working very hard. Our existing contract is coming to a close at the end of the year and they have been negotiating a new contract for January 2020 which the Board has selected and passed. The new contract will be a bundle of TV and Internet. Everyone will have access to the X1 platform with voice controlled remote and units for 3 TV's (rather than the 2 in our current contract).

You will retain HBO and all the channels you enjoy. In addition, it includes the modem/router for high speed internet. If you currently use Comcast for internet the account will switch over so you will not continue to be billed separately from your monthly maintenance.

If you use another provider now, Comcast will provide their modem/router at no charge. In all instances, if your home needs wiring you will be able to have them come in and check all the wiring, again at no charge. Comcast will be setting up dates for discussion, review of your bills and setting up appointments. (Phone service is optional and residents who want it may negotiate for it separately.)



REUSE, REPURPOSE



WHAT TO DO WITH COFFEE GROUNDS

 Exfoliate with a body scrub made of coffee grounds, coconut oil and a little brown sugar. Gently massage it on in the shower and rinse.

• Use coffee grounds as mulch for acid-loving plants —

roses, azaleas, rhododendrons, evergreens, hydrangeas and camellias. They like coffee grounds for the natural acidity and nutrients they add to the soil.

- Sprinkle coffee grounds around areas of ant infestation to deter them.
- Used grounds are said to repel snails and slugs, so sprinkle them in problem areas.
- Keep kitties out of the garden with a mixture of orange peels and used coffee grounds distributed around plants.

WHAT TO DO WITH TEA LEAVES AND TEA BAGS

- Cool tea bags can bring relief when applied to bug bites and minor burns, including sunburn. For overall skin irritation, put spent tea leaves in a bath and soak.
- The tannins in tea have antiinflammatory effects, which is why cool ones are often employed on puffy eyes. (The chill also helps with swelling.)
- Use tea leaves as food for garden plants — green tea is high in nitrogen, and as a bonus, the leaves can ward off pests and insects. This is also good for houseplants, so add old tea leaves to their water.
- When potting plants, place a few used tea bags on top of the drainage layer at the bottom of the planter before adding

soil. The tea bags will help to retain water and will also leach some nutrients into the potting medium.

- Sprinkle used, dried tea leaves in litter boxes to help reduce the smell. Sprinkle dried, used green tea leaves on your pet's pillow, bed, in the doghouse, or other smelly spots to eliminate odor.
- If you're out of baking soda, place dried, used green tea bags or leaves in a small open bowl in your refrigerator to help absorb odors.
- Rid your hands of food odors (garlic, onions, etc.) by rubbing them with wet green tea leaves, an instant deodorizer.
- Rub wet tea leaves on cutting boards and counters to remove food odors.

RECYCLING - Please continue to do your part to help the environment by properly disposing of recyclable paper and cardboard items in the yellow bins and plastic, glass and metal food and drink containers and cans in the blue bins. Itemized lists are printed on the bins, the Rainberry website, previous Beacons, in the Welcome packages and club house turnstile. Cardboard boxes should be cut or torn into flat pieces no larger than 3' by 3'. SWA.org/recycling has a lot of specific information. And please remember - <u>no plastic bags or Styrofoam</u> in the recycle bins.

SWA has been leaving behind some items that do not belong in recycle bins. When you "recycle" a pizza box that has grease / food on it, all of the contents of the yellow bin are typically deemed contaminated and trashed. Containers with food and items such as dryer vent hoses and paint cans should not be put in recycle bins. Please put only the listed acceptable items in the recycle bins. When in doubt put it in the trash.

TRASH - SWA's Renewable Energy Facility #2 in WPB reduces the waste going to SWA's landfill by almost 90 percent, thereby extending the active life of the landfill. The burning of trash generates 100 megawatts of electricity, providing power for more than 40,000 Palm Beach County homes and businesses. If you're discarding furniture items, consider donating to a charity. Large/bulk items are picked up on Fridays and should not be put curbside before 4 PM Thursdays.

A BIG thank you to all the CERT members and leaders who volunteer their time and efforts and stand ready to serve the RB community.

Rainberry Bay Annual Collection Update:

I have had a busy summer commnicating with DB Police and Fire and Rescue Departments regarding Rainberry Bay's donations of \$2,000 each.

- <u>DB POLICE</u>: I followed up with DB Police Chief Sims about how they will use our donation of \$2,000. They decided to purchase two DB Police Department photo screen backdrops: one which will be utilized in their Training Room for a photo op with Police and other DB government officials; and the second one will be a portable backdrop which they will use on recruiting trips and other Delray Beach community events. The photo screens depict DB Police members and past community events.
- <u>DB FIRE and RESCUE</u>: Two (2) Automatic External Defibrillators (AED) and two Stop the Bleed Kits will be purchased. The AED defibrillator is designed for the layperson

to apply to a victim suffering an acute cardiac event. It does the same function as the ones that are carried on the EMS fire rescue vehicles. The AED's automatically provide a shock to the heart to reestablish a rhythm or heartbeat. The Stop the Bleed kits have military grade Combat Application tourniquets (CAT) and hemostatic gauze. These can be used to stop large blood loss for a victim due to a shooting or accident where major arteries are severed. Both of these are life saving devices that will be placed in a Delray Beach public building for use. They can be used by bystanders to save someone when seconds count before the fire rescue arrives.

Both the Police and Fire and Rescue Departments again expressed their sincere gratitude to Rainberry Bay for these donations. Thank you again to all the residents who donated.





PICKLEBALL Steve Bodner

Your serve is the one shot you have complete control over during a pickleball game. You can visualize ball placement, take a breath and send the ball exactly where you want it to go. But it can be surprisingly difficult to develop a reliable serve even when you have all of these factors in your favor. Four tips:

- 1. Keep the ball in front of your body. Keep the ball and your target in the same sight line.
- Don't use a big drop when releasing the ball from your hand. Keep the ball relatively close to your paddle and don't use any big motions that might create more of a trajectory.
- 3. Follow thru in the direction of your target with your arm and paddle. The target should be your opponent in the box diagonally opposite you.
- 4. Develop a pre-shot routine. You will want to aim for your opponent's weak point (usually their backhand). Make notes of any outside interference from the elements such as sun glare (lob serve) and wind direction. Good luck and please come out on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Sundays at 6pm. All are welcome.

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
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
